Three of these phages infect *Bacillus pumilis*. Bp8p-C and Bp8p-T have "an isometric head with a diameter of 88 nm, a 189-nm-long contractile tail, a 60-nm-long tail needle, and a 20-nm-long and 46-nm-wide baseplate (5)". phiAGATE displays a head which is roughly icosahedral, with diameter of 91 nm, and a contractile tail 165 nm long (4) (Fig. 1). Bobb is described as a Bacillus thuringiensis subspecies Kurstaki phage. There is no published data on this virus.

All of these phages encode a ParM homolog which suggests a plasmid-like state in "lysogenized" cells.

The genome of phiAGATE contains LTRs (long direct terminal repeats) of 2669 bp. These were not noted with the other genomes.

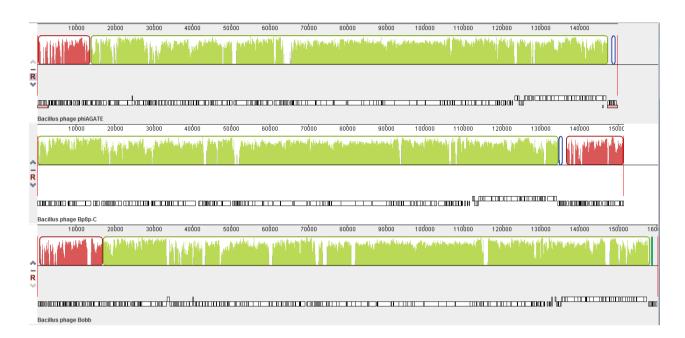


Fig. 3. Phylogenetic analysis of major capsid proteins of Agate-like viruses and variety of other *Bacillus* phage proteins constructed using "one click" at phylogeny.fr (3). N.B. The capsid gene of Hoody T contained a frameshift which was corrected prior to this analysis. "The "One Click mode" targets users that do not wish to deal with program and parameter selection. By default, the pipeline is already set up to run and connect programs recognized for their accuracy and speed (MUSCLE for multiple alignment and PhyML for phylogeny) to reconstruct a robust phylogenetic tree from a set of sequences." It also includes the use of Gblocks to eliminate poorly aligned positions and divergent regions. "The usual bootstrapping procedure is replaced by a new confidence index that is much faster to compute. See: Anisimova M., Gascuel O. Approximate likelihood ratio test for branches: A fast, accurate and powerful alternative (Syst Biol. 2006;55(4):539-52.) for details."

A phylogenetic analysis (3) of the major capsid proteins (Fig. 3), large subunit terminase (Fig. 4) and metallophosphatase (Fig. 5), of all the current large *Bacillus* myoviruses reveals clustering which can be confirmed by total genome (BLASTN; progressiveMauve, 1) and proteomic (CoreGenes, 2) analyses.

Fig. 1. Electron micrograph of negatively stained phage phiAGATE (4).

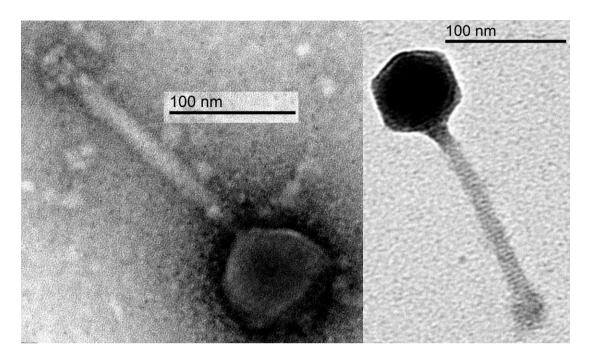

Fig. 2. progressiveMauve alignment (3) of the annotated genomes of members of the *Agatevirus* genus – top (phiAGATE); middle (Bp8p-C) and bottom (Bobb). Colored blocks indicate the regions of 1 to 1 best alignment with rearrangement breakpoints in a different random color. The degree of sequence similarity between regions is given by a similarity plot within the colored blocks with the height of the plot proportional to the average nucleotide identity (Aaron Darling, personal communication).

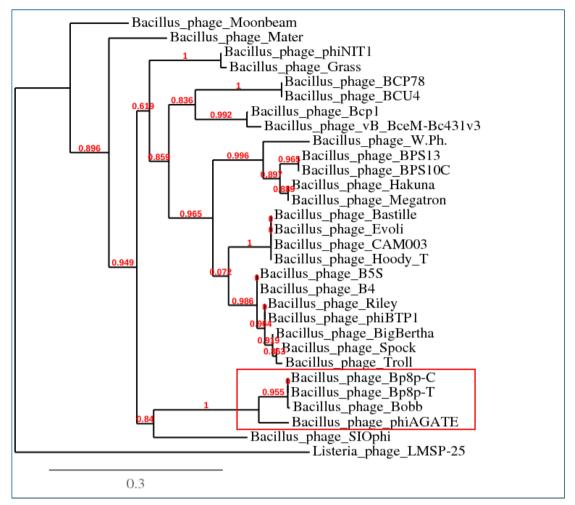


Figure 1: Phylogenetic tree (the branch length is proportional to the number of substitutions per site).

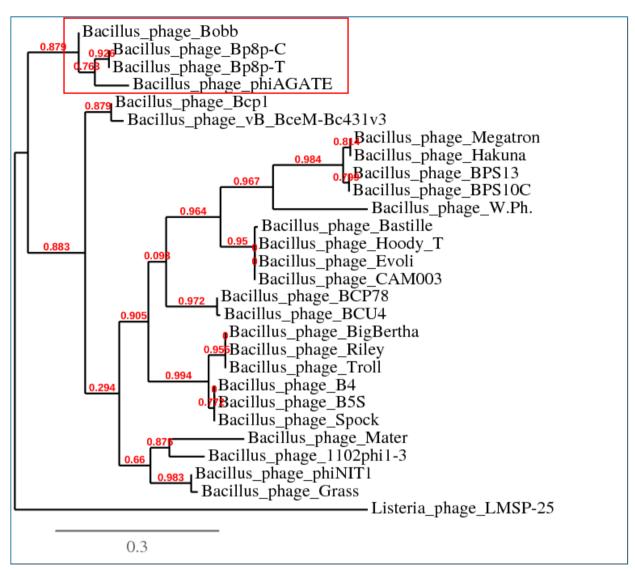


Figure 1: Phylogenetic tree (the branch length is proportional to the number of substitutions per site).

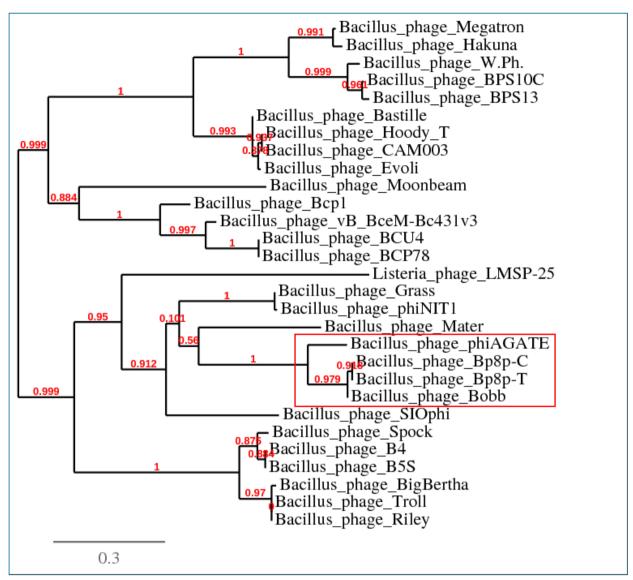


Figure 1: Phylogenetic tree (the branch length is proportional to the number of substitutions per site).
